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PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS:

Welcome Reception for Gene Conti (April 2009)

The WTS Charlotte Metro Chapter hosted a reception honoring Eugene A. Conti, Jr., Ph.D the newly appointed Secretary of Transportation for the North Carolina DOT. Cocktails and a dinner buffet were held at Byron's South End on Thursday, April 23, and guests were treated

to remarks from Dr. Conti following dinner.

The Secretary was appointed by Governor Beverly Perdue because of his experience as a professional transportation expert. He has served as the Assistant Secretary for Transportation Policy at the United States DOT, the Chief Deputy Secretary for the North Carolina DOT, and he most recently led business development



and community relations for PBS&J's Mid-South District.

Secretary Conti indicated that the state is actively applying for stimulus money to plan and construct several high priority projects in the State and the Charlotte area. He also discussed the local efforts to plan for a rail transit system between Charlotte and the municipalities of northern Mecklenburg County, and commended CATS for all of their accomplishments in working with the various jurisdictions to meet the needs of commuters.



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This was an exciting event for the Charlotte Metro Chapter, and it serves as an indication of the important programs and people



that WTS is able to attract. We thank Secretary Conti for his support of WTS, and his commitment to improving the state's infrastructure.

Walter Turner Shares the Interstate History of North Carolina (May 2009)

Walter R. Turner, historian at the NC Transportation Museum and fifth-generation North Carolinian, shared with us the past, pres-

ent and future of North Carolina's interstate history. His passion for North Carolina's transportation history was evident in his presentation.



In 1956, there were four

interstates in North Carolina, totally 714 interstate miles. In 1957, President Eisenhower added Interstate 77 to North Carolina's map. Today North Carolina has 1,120 interstate miles and another 200+ miles under construction. For six decades, North Carolina had the largest state maintained highway system. Then North Carolina was



surpassed by Texas' state maintained highway system.

Turner has written articles for Our State magazine, Business North Carolina, and the

state's major newspapers. His book, Paving Tobacco Road - A Century of Progress by the North Carolina Department of Transportation, was

published in 2003. This richly detailed and masterfully researched book captures the decade by decade drama of one of North Carolina's great untold stories: the "Good Roads State."

WTS Charlotte Metro Chapter to reach out to students at local universities and offer our 1st local WTS Scholarship.

- The local scholarship is a onetime scholarship for undergraduates.
- The local scholarship will run concurrently with applications for the National Scholarships and will follow the WTSS International criteria.
- The local scholarship winner will receive \$500, a t-shirt, and one year membership to WTS.

The Scholarship Committee will send a letter to the University of North Carolina at Charlotte, Clemson, and the University of South Carolina requesting applicants. Board members plan to visit to each of these Universities to introduce WTS and personally invite students to undertake careers in the area of transportation.

NATIONAL HIGHLIGHTS:

Transportation . . . Bringing Cities to Life

WTS Annual Conference, Seattle, WA - May 20 - 22, 2009

We would like to thank Mary Clayton for attending the WTS Annual Conference and representing the Charlotte Metro Chapter. The following is a brief recap from Mary's trip.

After a rather "exhilarating" plane ride into Seattle (a first-ever thunder storm, I was told), and circling for almost an hour so as to miss the lightning strikes, I made it into the airport and a late night catch-up with friends and coworkers at the Seattle Sheraton.

The next morning, and as part of the WTS Chapter Leadership meeting, there was a part of WTS' "special responsibilities" being immediately outlined, as the nearly 310+ women were there to share much of their corporate and various civic responsibilities in transportation and related responsibilities. One theme that echoed was how we can "make a difference" through the work that we are actually doing....

Even in the face of these economic times, many representatives discussed how to create more "member value" and to work to create improved policy impact in transportation.

Several key points from various presentations included:

- Significant work of the WTS Foundation and the award of \$900,000 thus far.
- Agreement about our "functionality" and that the members are "owners" and want to do even more.
- We exist to achieve a common vision/mission that members cannot individually achieve.



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Advancing Women in Transportation Charlotte Metro Chapter

Strategic plan provides focus for our policy/programs, key responsibilities, organization and focus, leadership.

Diane James, WTS Executive Director, led a discussion about leadership and governance, and described many aspects of what we might hope to be through the work that we do. I found this most helpful, since I am always looking for ways to better myself.

Some of the key points, included:

- Leaders must be diligent in our support, trust and cooperation with each other, and the desire should be a desire for teamwork.
- Being diligent in preparing for meetings and attending them.
- There should be robust dialogue which will lead to accomplishment of organizational goals (not personal ones).
- Set collaborative agenda.
- Communicate a positive board culture.
- Consider the experience we are trying to develop as one of "board service."
- Facilitate solutions.
- Step out of the solutions so that they can be found.
- Have a fresh perspective.
- Contribute to diversity.
- Represent your membership.
- Possess leadership qualities in everything that you do.
- Illustrate credibility and prestige.
- Have contacts and a depth of knowledge.
- Have succession planning and succession thinking.

There were several compelling sessions at this conference, but there are a couple I want to highlight. One of the plenary sessions entitled "Connecting the DOTs: Transportation Projects, Stimulus and Navigating through Challenging Times", was just unforgettable. It was four incredibly wonderful women (aren't they all?). They were Gail Achter-

man, Chair of Oregon's Transportation Commission and the WTS Portland Chapter (2008) Woman of the Year, Paula Hammond, Secretary of Transportation Washington DOT, Luisa Paiewonsky, Commissioner, Massachusetts Highway Department and WTS Woman of the Year, 2009 and Beverley Swaim-Staley, Deputy Sec of Transportation, Maryland DOT. These women talked about how to implement programs effectively and what some of the most difficult tasks were that each of them had faced in their careers. It was a fascinating discussion of how they had "managed expectations," but also how they had dealt with the fundamental needs. And, these women were terrific speakers and had a sense of balance and understood much of what we all face today in the careers that we are in.

Finally, I have to say that one of the presentations that I enjoyed the most was that of Anne Levinson, Force 10 Hoops, LLC and her perspective about the various roles that she has played in rising to the top of a professional sports team effort via her roles in government. She was funny, but in an under-stated way, but taught us all that as a female owner, who has worked her way through the gay-rights efforts, there was quite a bit to overcome. Seattle loves her, and you could see why. She has done a terrific job.




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MEMBER SPOTLIGHT:
