

2019 WTS International Conference



The WTS Houston Chapter had nine members attend the 2019 WTS Annual Conference in Boston, MA. The conference theme was the Hub of Ingenuity and the three day sessions allowed transportation leaders to connect and exchange ideas about the latest developments in the industry. Over 700 corporate and governmental transportation leaders were in attendance, and many thoughtful and engaging topics were covered.

The Houston Chapter was able to award \$4,000 in scholarships to five members for conference attendance. The Chapter also provided a \$1,000 scholarship to a student member, Xiaoyu (Sky) Guo of Texas A&M University.

The WTS Houston Chapter's Mentorship Program, led by Monisha Khurana and Victoria Mota, is in its second year. The program focuses on professional development and growth for all participants, mentors and mentees alike. Mentors, who include mid-level and senior transportation professionals, are matched with mentees, who are mid-level and junior WTS members. Mentors and mentees meet individually for one hour every month over the duration of the program (April to October), and mentees attend monthly group events.

During the course of the year, the Mentorship Program hosted two professional development panels. In May, the Mentorship Program hosted a career panel. Featured panelists included Sirisha Pillalamarri (WTS Houston Director of Programs and Principal at Transcend Engineers & Planners), ReShane Dawn-Fowler (WTS Houston Treasurer and Marketing Manager at the Gunda Corporation) and Anita Hollmann (Regional Planning Manager at H-GAC). The panelists spoke about their career paths, strategies for time management, networking tips, and answered mentees questions about how to navigate a career in the transportation industry.

In August, Roma Stevens, President of Stevens Technical Services, spoke about salary negotiation. She led a discussion about self-advocacy in the workplace, giving concrete tips on how to approach conversations and instilling confidence in the mentees to go forth and ask for what they deserve. Mentees had the opportunity to discuss their own experiences as well and learn from each other.

The Mentorship Program encourages participation in the WTS Houston Chapter's Soft Skills Workshops, including the Networking Naturally and Public Speaking workshops held by the Chapter this summer. Other activities organized by the Mentorship program included a kickoff meeting in April, where all program participants had the opportunity to meet each other, an Escape Room activity in July, and small group lunches in September. The program will conclude with a graduation celebration lunch in October.

She says the WTS Houston Gala was empowering and was amazed by the number of women leading in their various industries. She has started attending the WTS Dallas meetings and is working on getting a membership. She thanks WTS Houston for its generosity, support and for helping her accomplish a major feat that will impact generations in her family!

Nicole Mut was accepted at Washington University in St. Louis and is majoring in chemical engineering. The Transportation You scholarship freed up money in her budget to purchase a laptop and textbooks. With her parents sending 2 children to college (remember she has a twin, Michelle) the WTS Houston scholarship was a blessing. Attending the Gala left her feeling empowered. It also demonstrated to her how important women in places of power need to actively lift up other women.

Student Chapter Highlight WTS Texas A&M Student Chapter

WTS-TAMU endorses the objectives of WTSI to promote the advancement of women in the transportation industry. The chapter provides supplemental education about the professional practice of transportation-related work by inviting distinguished lecturers, developing a leadership training event, and a mentoring program. This student chapter has been established in April 2017 and is a recognized student chapter within Texas A&M University. Academic Year 2018-2019 was the second year of WTS TAMU and our activity within the campus has grown since then. What makes WTS-TAMU unique to the university is our review event and a salary negotiation workshop. dedication to the advancement of women in transportation. We include women of multiple disciplines such as civil engineering, computer engineering, urban planners and environmental professionals.

Membership in this organization is open to all enrolled students at Texas A&M. Being a student member provides the chance to attend WTS-TAMU meetings, WTS leadership conferences, networking events and apply for scholarships. WTS-TAMU has 123 members currently enrolled in our student chapter. University wide and department specific recruitment events (3 events were held last year) helped WTS-TAMU in having improved membership.

For the academic year August 2018 - August 2019, WTS-TAMU conducted 3 technical general meetings. General

meetings are held to make members aware of the industry. Last year WTS-TAMU followed the theme "towards a student" chapter attended 2019 leadership summit" for its activities. The general meetings catered to that theme by connecting our members to professionals in the area of leadership development and transportation research. Members were encouraged to ask questions at the end of a one-hour session. All the meetings had attendance ranging from 15-25 students. Apart from the technical meetings, four leadership programs were taken up - including a seminar, communication workshop, resume

STEM EVENTS

Girls in STEM Conference

WTS Houston Chapter STEM Committee participated at the second annual Girls in STEM Conference, which was held at Alief Taylor High School on Saturday, October 5, 2019. STEM Committee Chair, Agueda Guerra was joined by the its Committee members: Sruthi Ashraf, Amma Cobbinah, Sky Guo and Suzanna Set.

The Committee presented "What's Your Sign?", which introduced students to roadway signages. The students learned about the meaning and the importance of the different types and colors of signs that are found on the streets and major roadways, purpose of the signs, and the need for retro-reflectivity and angle of reflections. After the presentation, each student made their own sign and looked through small sample of retro-reflective signing sheets with a mini-microscope.

The STEM Committee presented three sessions during conference, one in the morning and two in the afternoon, each session had 20 - 25 students of ages 10 - 13. Each session was interactive and students asked the presenters questions about transportation engineering and college in general. Although many of the signs designed were not be in compliance with the Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Device (MUTCD), but students displayed creative with their design and had lots of fun creating them.

The students were enthusiastic throughout the sessions and were asking questions. Their major take-aways were:

- Existence of brown and purple signs
- The signs are not shiny because of the metal plates or lights
- Shape and color of signs matter

Students and volunteers all had a great time. We look forward to teaming up with Girlstart in this conference again and other future events!
