

The WTS Houston Chapter initiated a member to member Mentorship program this year. The program, modeled after the WTS DC Chapter, focuses on professional development and growth for all participants. As part of the program, mentors and mentees meet individually for one hour per month over the seven-month duration of the program, from April through November. Mentors and mentees were paired based upon professional interests and career focus areas.

The Mentorship Program hosted events for the participants each month, alternating between informal happy hours and panels focusing on specific professional development topics.

Highlights of the program included a Career Panel and a discussion regarding Salary Negotiation and Self-Advocacy. The Career Panel in May featured Inas Aweidah (Senior Manager, AECOM), Roma Stevens (President, Stevens Technical Services) and Kimberly Williams (Chief Innovation Officer, METRO). At this panel, mentees had the opportunity to learn from three leaders in the transportation industry. The panelists spoke openly about their careers in the industry, the paths they took and the lessons they have learned along the way, including the importance of skills,

The panelists discussed the importance of identifying individual values and stretching and challenging yourself for growth.

Mentees had the opportunity to discuss their own experiences as well and learn from each other.

Other events to-date included a kickoff meeting in April where mentors and mentees had the opportunity to meet other program participants, the WTS Houston's Conflict Resolution Soft Skills workshop in July, an Escape Room activity in June, and a happy hour in August. The program will conclude with a graduation ceremony in November.
