

As WTS-LA Celebrates Its 30th Anniversary, We Look at How the Whole Thing Started

After several decades of helping women find opportunity and recognition in the Los Angeles-area transportation industry, WTS-LA now celebrates its 30th anniversary—a perfect time to hear from the women who founded WTS and learn why its original name was "Women's Transportation Seminar."

In 2005, *Mass Transit* magazine explored the 1977 founding of Women's Transportation Seminar. The magazine found that including "seminar" in the organization's name served as an ingenious stratagem. In those days, companies rarely paid for women to attend professional meetings. They would, however, pay for educational "seminars."

WTS has grown considerably since Christine J. Vineis brought 40 women together and founded the first chapter in Washington, D.C. In Mass Transit, she describes the culture of the time and why she was driven to take that step. And Ms. Vineis isn't the only voice captured in the article.
