There is most certainly an "I" in leadership.....

Amelia Earhart said, "The most difficult thing is the decision to act, the rest is merely tenacity." How do you not love that? Merely tenacity. Ms. Earhart is talking about leadership. At its core, leadership is the decision to act. But there is a misconception when it comes to leadership. People always think of it only in grandiose terms. If you talk leadership, people think presidents, generals, CEOs, board chairmen. But in fact, leadership often starts quite small. It's one decision on one project. It's one choice when you're driving. It's one moment in a meeting when you speak up. Those are moments you build on to become a leader. And that's because real leaders are not born. But once they started making decisions, taking stands, owning the responsibility for each and every



decision, people responded to them. The blowhard charlatans eventually fall or fail, mostly because they lack the stuff true leaders learn to cultivate—the mettle to act with accountability. So, what am I on about with this?
