On July 26, WTS-LA was one of the first organizations to welcome newly appointed Port of Long Beach (POLB) executive director Mario Cordero. Held at the Westin Long Beach, the evening reception honored the international maritime leader, former federal maritime official, former Long Beach Harbor Commissioner, attorney, and Long Beach resident. With POLB doing more than \$180 billion worth of trade moves and generating more nearly 350,000 jobs in Southern California—not to mention significant revenues in various forms—attendance at the reception was standing room only. Both public and private sector leaders and professionals filled the Westin to hear Mario Cordero talk about everything from the economic strength of the Port, to the complex Gerald Desmond Bridge Replacement Project, to the first female slate of harbor commissioners in the Port's 105-year history. By virtually every measure, it was an extraordinary night.
