But in certain Los Angeles high schools, WTS-LA is helping to make sure that high school is a very positive experience. Through the Transportation YOU committee, WTS-LA is exerting profound influence on some burgeoning young scholars, opening their eyes to opportunity in a profession that is often overlooked in the high school years and providing much-needed funds.

"Through our Adopt-A-School program, our committee is trying to bring excitement and awareness to high school students for careers in transportation," explains Transportation YOU co-chair Sharlane Bailey. "We hope to extend that awareness and reach out to other students because to me, transportation is exciting, challenging, cutting-edge, and meaningful work." Her co-chair, Barbara Marquez agrees. She points out that this year, WTS-LA high school scholarships focused on two schools through the WTS-LA Adopt-A-School program: Westchester and Dorsey High Schools. And this year, WTS-LA awarded nearly \$20,000 in five scholarships to deserving Westchester and Dorsey High School students.

To be held on November 7, the 2019 WTS-LA Annual Scholarship and Awards Dinner welcomes all high scholarship winners to attend and speak when they receive their award. And while we can't name the specific high school winners—as they are minors—we would like to acknowledge either the scholarship sponsor or its namesake. All of the scholarships were awarded to academically successful high school seniors with supporting recommendations and completed applications.
