
Reimaging how we use our residential streets

- Crossings for all roadway users





- Promote pedestrian and bicycle safety.
 - High visibility crosswalks
 - o Protected/separated bike lanes
 - Green markings to alert drivers and bicyclist to crossing conflict areas

COMMUNITY PRIORITIES

Safety to reduce number of people killed or injured on Tucson's streets, especially people walking and biking.

Maintenance for Tucson's aging transportation system.

Efficiency for crosstown travel by updating traffic signals and modernizing corridors.

Choices for more high-quality travel options like comfortable, connected, and accessible infrastructure.

PRIORITIES FOR NEXT 20+ YEARS

Phase 2 Virtual Public Open House launching in January.

Develop prioritized list using safety performance as primary criteria and crash history as additional filter.


