# **TREASURY**

### JOB BANK

The Washington Chapter Job Bank activities expanded significantly this year, responding to cutbacks in hiring and planned layoffs in Washington. Of particular note are the following highlights from the year:

- The Chapter sponsored three job hunting workshops on consecutive Saturdays in September. Participants acquired a variety of job hunting techniques, including skill assessment, resume writing, and salary negotiations.
- The Job Bank Committee helped organize a network of women's organizations in order to share job information and explore areas of mutual interest. Now formally called the Women's Job Network, WTS is proud of this cooperative effort and plans to continue efforts to expand job opportunities for members.
- The Committee arranged special presentations regarding employment and career development, including a RIF workshop and a roundtable on the local labor market.
- Maintaining the WTS Job Bank is the committee's most important responsibility. The number of resumes in the Job Bank is growing as is the number of referrals informing the Job Bank of available positions. The Bank has instituted a new means of collecting and storing information regarding members' interests. Members may now clip and fill out a form, published in the Newsletter, in lieu of or in addition to providing resumes.

# LEGISLATIVE

During 1981, the Legislative Committee held several successful programs featuring many Congressional Members and staff who play a key role in the development of transportation legislation. Of special interest were the informal briefings and round tables featuring staff from the Budget Committees and Commerce Committees in the Senate and House on such topics as "Transportation and the Budget Process" and the "Northeast Rail Service Act of 1981".

Each year the Legislative Committee sponsors a monthly luncheon featuring a prominent lawmaker involved in transportation issues. WTS was fortunate to have Senator Nancy Kassebaum from Kansas at one of our most well attended luncheons this year.

In October, the Legislative Committee sponsored the Annual WTS Congressional Reception honoring the following Members of Congress for their significant contributions toward the goals of the transportation industry:

All four honored guests attended, along with excellent participation from WTS members and guests. This year's Congressional Reception was organized by Mary Legatski, Manager for Regulatory Affairs, FMC Corporation.

For the first time, this year the Legislative Committee initiated a targeted membership drive, aimed at attracting additional members with a specific interest in transportation legislative issues. This year's drive succeeded in adding to WTS ranks several members with a legislative interest. The Legislative Committee intends to continue this effort in 1982.

### MEDIA RELATIONS

On August 31, the name of the Publicity Committee was officially changed to the Media Relations Committee by the Chapter Board to more accurately reflect the Committee's primary function of developing media contacts and securing press coverage of WTS.

The goals established by the Committee for this year include name recognition of WTS, and identification of WTS as a resource for transportation expertise and as a neutral forum for key transportation officials on major issues.

The press list of the Washington media was revamped in March. It is now structured into the following categories: primary coverage, chains and service bureaus, newspaper bureaus, television networks, television news bureaus and networks, Washington television stations, Washington radio stations, general magazines, and trade press.

Press releases on the monthly luncheons and roundtables were distributed in February, March, April, May, June, and July. Press releases were also issued for special events, such as the anniversary party in January, additional luncheons, and the scholarship awards in April. The press releases were supplemented by follow-up telephone calls to reporters prior to the events by members of the Media Relations Committee. WTS events were also covered by local radio reporters and, on two instances, by NBC News.

WTS Washington Chapter President Martha Schwendeman and Media Relations Chair Drucella Andersen appeared on a local cable television talk show in July. The show was aired four times, both in the morning and in the evening during the third week of July. The tape is scheduled to be shown during the WTS Second Annual Conference in Philadelphia and it wil also be

shown during a Chapter roundtable on September 10. Additional talk show appearances by Washington Chapter Officers are being scheduled in New York, Ohio, and in Washington, D.C.

In November, the Washington Chapter President appeared with the WTS New York Chapter President on a television talk show devoted to business and economic issues in New York City. Other talk show appearances by Washington Chapter Officers are being explored with television stations in Cincinnati and Washington, D.C.

The Media Relations Chair commissioned a podium sign featuring the WTS name and logo to be used at Chapter events because of the increase in photographic and television coverage. The sign is also being used as a prop during talk show appearances.

Further, the Washington Chapter Board recently voted to adapt the Chapter logo to conform with the new national logo developed by WTS. The national logo was adopted by all the WTS Chapters across the country, with the exception of the San Francisco Chapter. The use of a uniform logo will help to give WTS nation-wide symbol recognition.

Fact sheets on WTS have been developed as background materials for the press. One is "A Short History of WTS," and another one contains the Officers' biographies. Additional fact sheets, specifically dealing with membership statistics and publicity tips for luncheon sponsors to consider, are planned.

The Media Relations Chair conducted a survey of the men Chapter members in July. An article based on this survey is scheduled to appear in the October issue of the WTS Newsletter.

Future projects include setting up and coordinating a Chapter speakers' bureau, establishing contacts with reporters for working women's magazines, writing additional articles for the WTS Newsletter, and compiling a publicity book of WTS press clippings.

# GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The Goals and Objectives Committee was created at the April 1981, Washington-WTS Board of Directors meeting. The Committee's major tasks are as follows:

- Organization of informal gatherings of the membership for the purpose of obtaining "grassroots" input for the development of chapter goals and objectives.
- Development of survey instrument to determine members' needs and interests and designed to solicit information regarding current and future WTS programs and activities.
- 3) Research of similar organizations' goals and objectives, including personal interviews with persons involved in the development of the goals and objectives. This task also included research of the actual structure of the goals and objectives within the particular organization's framework.

The Goals and Objectives Committee has held regular monthly meetings since May 1981. The three tasks previously outlined were assigned to Committee members based on individual skills and interests.

To date, information has been solicited from over 20 organizations for the purpose of researching their goals and objectives. This information is currently being analyzed to determine its usefulness and applicability in the development of our chapter's goals and objectives. Additionally, the Committee undertook a survey which was published in the November newsletter. The surveys are now being returned and those received prior to December 30 will be tabulated and analyzed to provide additional information for the development of chapter goals and objectives. Four dinners were held during August and September of this year. These dinners were well received, with approximately 10% of our membership in attendance.

The Goals and Objectives Committee intends to develop a specific set of goals and objectives for Washington-WTS by March 1982. We hope to serve as a model for other WTS chapters and are currently providing the Atlanta Chapter with assistance in this area.

### **MEMBERSHIP**

WTS, Washington had 365 members as of December 8, 1981. Of these, 345 were full members and 20 received our newsletter only. The Chapter published a Directory in July which contains each member's name, position title, office telephone number and place of employment. It is also cross-indexed by organization to facilitate access to individual members.

The WTS Board decided at its August Board meeting to institute a rolling membership year. Effective September 1, 1981, persons joining the organization will do so for a full year of member benefits at \$30.00. Membership of individuals who joined before September 1, 1981, will expire February 28, 1982, with renewal until February's end 1983.

The rolling membership year will ensure a full year of membership benefits regardless of when an individual joins the organization. It will also provide a year-round incentive to join the organization.

### SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships of \$150 were awarded to two Washington area university students at the January WTS luncheon. The recipients of these awards are Becky Shulz of George Washington University and Elaine Saunders of the University of Maryland.

This is the third year that the Washington chapter has offered scholarships to assist undergraduate level women in area universities in preparing for careers in transportation.

### ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Ellen D. Hanson received the Chapter's 1980 Achievement Award at the Chapter's fourth anniversary party on January 29, 1981. The annual award recognizes and honors a woman who has contributed through her professional achievement and contributions to the advancement of women in the field of transportation.

A charter member of WTS, Ellen consistently demonstrated her sincere commitment to the promotion of WTS, its goals and objectives through her professional achievement, active leadership, and direct involvement in WTS. In addition, Ellen's personal belief in and support of a national network of skilled career women in transportation have helped create wider opportunities for women to develop expertise and professional capabilities in the transportation field.
