Mayer speaks highly of WTS as it offers opportunities to network, attracts people in leadership positions in major agencies and companies, and our



Pratt Institute in Manhattan offers a continuing education class, "Connecting Us...The Arterial Highway System of the NY-NJ Region." This is a one-day course, accredited by NY State for seven PDH towards license renewal for PEs and RAs.

This course reviews the development of NYC's arterial highway system, focusing particularly from the 1930's through the present. It examines key influences and "influencers,"system milestones, points of controversy, current system status, and the outlook for the future

The course presents and analyzes past, current, and emerging concepts for policy, planning, and operations of the arterial highway system including, for example, context-sensitive design, Bus Rapid Transit, managed lanes, autonomous vehicles, etc.
