Learn from a Leader (continued)

Managing office politics. "It's a topic that has always bedeviled me," commented Emily Gallo, NYC DOT Chief of Staff, in the last Learn from a Leader program of the year on August 23rd as she energetically launched into her talk on her own professional experience "to address the subject head-on." Prior to her role at DOT,

she was Chief of Staff at the Taxi and Limousine Commission where she had been Director of Policy. And before that, she was a policy analyst in the Mayor's Office of Long-Term Strategy and Sustainability.

Getting along with others had never been an issue for her, so Gallo was surprised by the challenges that office politics presented. This

was not a topic her professors in graduate school certainly had ever touched on! After thoughtful evaluation, she has come to the conclusion that there are several strategies to manage this taboo subject:

When your boss hires someone new, it's a great idea to try to understand why he or she was selected and what his or her strengths are. It's also worth sticking up for that new person. Everyone knows how it feels to be unfamiliar with the culture and practices of a new office. Putting someone at ease and offering them some insight into their new surroundings will be immeasurably appreciated.

Be underfoot. Make yourself available. Gallo described her boss in a previous job calling in early one morning when she was already sitting at her desk before others had arrived. The boss asked to speak with one person and then another. When Gallo let him know that neither of them were around and that she would be happy to help, he was greatly relieved. In short order, he was calling her regularly at that time relying on her assistance. Gallo also pointed out that when you aren't around, make sure everyone knows where you are, whether it's out at a meeting or in the field so that they know when you'll be available again and that you are doing something productive even if you aren't visible.

Make sure you have mentors and sponsors. Find people who can support you and offer you guidance, and do likewise. In offering your support to others, you'll have the opportunity for reciprocation at a later time.

Be direct and honest. Pass along positive feedback. You can do this even if you are the junior staff member. If no one speaks up, the boss would never get any feedback. Pass along negative feedback too. As women, we often try to be peacemakers and are oblique about anything that might make others uncomfortable. Better to be open about something than let it fester.

Your work doesn't speak for itself. You speak for your work. Promote yourself.

Use positive body language to convey your strength. If you don't naturally pose in a way to show power or strength, fake it until you become it. Gallo urged the attendees to watch a <u>Ted Talk</u> given by Amy Cuddy, a Harvard Business School professor on how your body language shapes who you are.

Gallo's thoughtful and insightful remarks engaged everyone in the audience and led to an animated discussion about circumstances that many women around the table had encountered. What to do about tone in email? How much small talk does one need to make? The conversation was lively and informative for everyone thanks to the Learn from the Leader program and the leader, Emily Gallo.
