NYC Mobility Report 2018 by the DOT says that the demand on the city's transportation system remains the overall trend since 2019. While the number of residents, jobs and visitors have continued to increase, subway ridership plateaued in 2014 and bus ridership has fallen each year. At the same time cycling trips have shown an increase of 84% from 2010. One of the reasons is the increase in the usage of app-based for-hire services such as Uber and Lyft. 
# **Membership Appreciation Event**

On August 22<sup>nd</sup>, WTS Greater New York Chapter, the New Jersey Innovation Institute (NJII), and the North Jersey Transportation Planning Authority (NJTPA) invited participants to join in the exploration of the future of transportation with welcoming remarks from NJ Commissioner of Transportation Diane Gutierrez-Scaccetti, as well as panel discussions and interactive showcases.

The event was held at the state-of-the-art Agile Lab at NJIT, an innovation in of itself. The New Jersey Innovation Institute (NJII) is an NJIT corporation focused on helping private enterprise discover what's possible. Whether it's working to solve the grand challenges shared across an entire sector or helping a single company find an innovative way to pursue a new product or marketing opportunity, NJII brings world-class intellectual and technological resources to bear. The organization is unique in its role as a not-for-profit corporation in pursuit of economic development and its agility to transform intellectual capital into commercial success.

After about a half hour of networking with a capacity crowd of over 140 attendees, including the NJDOT Commissioner Diane Gutierrez-Scaccetti, Former NJDOT Commissioner Steve Dilts, several other public and private sector transportation leaders, as well as numerous innovators, it was time for the official welcome.

Zenobia Fields, WTS-GNY NJ Vice President, introduced the first speaker, Dr. Don Sebastian, CEO and President of NJII and Vice President of Technology and Business Development at New Jersey Institute of Technology (NJIT), emphasizing that the audience was there to hear about how these emerging technologies - such as virtual reality, real-time operations data, smart kiosks, drones, Mobility as a Service (MaaS), and expanded ride hailing services- can be leveraged for a more efficient transportation delivery system as well as new partnerships that can be fostered. Dr. Sebastian spoke about the evolution of transportation and technology occurring in tandem, starting with the shaping of canals and greenways and ending with disruptive events such as ride hailing and social mobility.

The Commissioner recast Dr. Sebastian's description of technology as disruptive, saying she preferred to think of it as transformative. She continued by asserting that while we think about how automation and our roadways can be scary, it is always better to know you do not have to tackle a fear alone, but that you can collaborate. She also talked about matching up collaboration and innovation to allow for simple improvements in our day-to-day work program tasks. The Commissioner again referenced Dr. Sebastian's talk about aligning innovation with transportation delivery, giving examples of truck platooning (which comprises a number of trucks equipped with state-of-the-art driving support systems in which one closely follows the next. Together, this forms a platoon with the trucks driven by smart technology, and mutual communication.) and traffic signal optimization. And she remarked on the use of technology to manage congestion, referencing the 495 effort (RestoreNJ495.com) with the use of drones to monitor traffic conditions.

The Commissioner concluded by saying that we need to consider ideas big and small and share our thoughts for the best solutions. This includes interoperability with data and software platforms, data exchange methods, investment, and partnerships for the future.

Through panel discussions moderated by co-hosts Thomas Motyka of NJII and Ms. Fields, participants also heard from experts of various disciplines about how the travel network will adapt to a world that includes mobility as a service, expanded ride hailing services, smart kiosks, adaptive traffic signals, drones and advanced traveler information. Expert panelists included representatives from Greenman-Pedersen, Inc. (GPI); Miovision Technologies Inc.; Transportation Operations Coordinating Committee (TRANSCOM); Intersection; NJII; ICF International, Inc.; EZ Ride Transportation Management Association (TMA) and Pixida USA Inc.
