2022 Woman of the Year Meera Joshi

Deputy Mayor for Operations, New York City



Meera Joshi is the deputy mayor for Operations, overseeing the City's infrastructure portfolio. Prior to joining the Adam's administration, Joshi was named by President Biden as deputy and acting administrator of the U.S.DOT's Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration, which is responsible for regulation of interstate trucking. In this role, she led initiatives aimed at improving roadway safety; the working conditions of truck drivers; and accountability mechanisms to integrate automation. Previously, Joshi was chair and CEO of the New York Taxi and Limousine Commission, the nation's largest for-hire transportation regulator. In this role, she spearheaded Vision Zero campaigns aimed at keeping high-risk drivers and unsafe vehicles off the road. She also oversaw landmark policy,

including establishing robust open transportation data standards; enacting the nation's first for-hire driver pay protection program; and providing broad and on-demand access to for-hire transportation for passengers who use wheelchairs. Her career in City government also includes a stint as inspector general of the Department of Corrections. She investigated corruption and wrongdoing at all levels of jail operations. Joshi also was first deputy executive director of the Civilian Complaint Review Board, where she led probes of civilian allegations into police misconduct.

Meanwhile, her private-sector experience includes working as general manager of the New York office of Sam Schwartz Transportation
Consultants and as a visiting scholar at New York University's Rudin
Center for Transportation Policy
Joshi holds and B.A. and J.D. from the University of Pennsylvania.

Introduction by Nuria Fernandez



Nuria Fernandez was confirmed by the U.S. Senate as the 15th administrator of the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) on June 10, 2021. Previously, she was appointed as deputy administrator and senior FTA official in January 2021. With over 35 years of experience. Fernandez made a name for herself as an inspiring leader in the transportation industry. Before joining the FTA, she served as general manager and CEO of the Santa Clara Valley Transportation Authority (VTA), where she was responsible for 2,100 employees and oversaw projects and transit programs that provide mobility solutions for more than two million individuals who live and work in Silicon Valley.

Among the highlights of her tenure at VTA was the completion of the first Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART) heavy rail service into Silicon Valley, a 10-mile, \$3 billion line that opened to passenger service in June 2020. She also secured federal approval in 2018 to extend the heavy rail service for another six miles. When completed in 2026, the heavy rail service will total 16 miles of rail and six stations that will provide transit alternatives for tens of thousands of commuters in and around the Silicon Valley.

Fernandez was responsible for the creation of VTA's Innovation Center, an incubator to encourage collaboration; test the latest technology; and imagine new ways to keep the region moving forward by leveraging the expertise of Silicon Valley's high-tech corporations and universities.

Her career also encompasses leadership positions at some of the busiest transit agencies in America, including COO of the New York Metropolitan Transportation Authority; senior vice president of Design and Construction for the Chicago Transit Authority (CTA); and the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority. In addition, she served as commissioner for the Chicago Department of Aviation, overseeing O'Hare and Midway airports.

In 1997, Fernandez was appointed by President Bill Clinton as acting administrator of FTA, where she oversaw all programs, includ-

She served as chair of the American Public Transportation Association from 2019 to 2020, as well as on the boards of the Mineta Transportation Institute, The Transportation Learning Center and the Executive Committee of the Transportation Research Board.

Fernandez holds a B.S. n Civil Engineering from Bradley University and an M.B.A. from Roosevelt University. ■

Disadvantaged Business Utilization, discussed the IIJA's impact on DBEs at the 2022 Women Business Owner's Roundtable. While acknowledging the opportunities that the law will yield, I joined other roundtable members to highlight the hurdles facing women owners of small- to medium-size firms. This led WTS International and the members of the 2022 WBE Roundtable to draft a follow-up letter to Director Scales with specific recommendations for these issues in future legislation. A top priority is to consolidate the certification process by providing a national certification for DBE firms, or through home state certification with simple reciprocity by other states/agencies to replace the current requirement for separate certification by each state. We hope that U.S.DOT will address this along with other challenges related to revenue caps and ownership rules to allow DBEs to take advantage of the opportunities offered by this groundbreaking legislation."
