

FINANCE COMMITTEE

COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE

The Communications Committee is responsible for both internal and external chapter communications, including streamlining communication to the membership as well as heightening awareness of WTS-Boston by identifying opportunities for media coverage of WTS-Boston programs and events. Golf Outing



MENTORING COMMITTEE

In 2019, the WTS-Boston Mentoring Committee developed programming that supported mentoring at all career levels, through the Formal Mentoring Program, TED Talk, Mid-Career Roundtable, and Emerging Professionals Program. The 2019 committee was co-chaired by Kristen Whitman of Jacobs and Caroline Leary of Dye Management Group, Inc. The Board liaison was Crystale Wozniak of Kleinfelder.

Formal Mentoring Program

We were excited to announce the implementation of a formal mentoring program for the Boston Chapter in 2019. The program's objective is to provide the opportunity for rising professionals to access more experienced professionals in the industry, allowing them to gain access and insights that could have a lasting and tangible effect on their careers. Mentors benefit from sharing career success stories with future women leaders, building long-term relationships, and giving back to an industry that has helped them in their careers. The program ran from January-June 2019 and included both one-on-one time with mentor-mentee pairs and group professional development events open to all program participants. The committee matched the mentor-mentee pairs after the kickoff speed dating-style event in January 2019. The program received a lot of positive feedback and we were fortunate enough to have multiple participants volunteer to help organize this year's program. The 2020 call for applications occurred in the fall and the committee received more applications than the number of spots, so the program has become competitive. We look forward to the 2020 program and hope for continued interest for years to come.



TED Talk co-hosted with the Diversity Committee

On July 17th, over 20 attendees gathered at Kleinfelder Boston office for a TED talk viewing and discussion facilitated by Margaret O'Meara, Northeast Transportation Segment Leader at Kleinfelder. The WTS-Boston Mentoring and Diversity Committees co-organized the event and selected the TED Talk "How to Get Serious About Diversity and Inclusion in the Workplace" by Janet Stovall, Executive Communications Manager at UPS and inclusion advocate.

In her talk, Janet describes her lifelong effort to combat racism through courage and focus, or as she calls it "single-mindedness." Janet recalls challenging racism as a student at Davidson College by creating an action-oriented report to hold the college's administration accountable for failing to enroll black students and hire black educators and administrators. Today, as a speechwriting and communications professional at UPS, Janet emphasizes that if businesses and employees became "single-minded" about racism, not only could we transform our workplaces into inclusive and diverse environments, but also change the way we coexist in our world outside of work. To make businesses address diversity and inclusion, Janet employs a three-point strategy: identifying real problems, finding real numbers, and creating real consequences. Additionally, she clarifies the difference between diversity, which can be mandated or quantified, and inclusion, which must be cultivated. Janet argues that businesses will not become "single-minded" about diversity and inclusion unless the problem becomes urgent and relevant to their bottom line. To her third point, Janet stresses that a lack of diversity and inclusion must result in real consequences for businesses in order for them to begin to take these matters seriously. To conclude, she asks the audience to imagine a diverse place of work, at all levels of leadership, where people of color feel safe and are expected to "bring their unassimilated selves to work because the perspective that they bring is both recognized and respected."

Following the talk, Margaret O'Meara described her own experiences with diversity and inclusion in her 30+ year career in the public and private sector. Margaret identified that her "single-mindedness" was about advancing the role of women in the workplace. Margaret's colleagues would eventually remark about what a great staff she had assembled, when in fact she had simply elevated and encouraged the women and minorities that were already working there, but who were often overlooked. To end, Margaret asked the attendees how the TED Talk impacted them. Some agreed with Janet's overall message but suggested that

education still played a major role in efforts to promote diversity and inclusion, because in our industry, it often dictates which candidates will be hired or promoted. Other attendees described efforts they have made at their own workplaces, such as creating Employee Resource Groups, which are designed to elevate issues of diversity and inclusion throughout their company. We also discussed the unique way the transportation industry affects issues of race and equity in our communities, and discrepancies in diversity and inclusion between the public and private sector. Margaret and other attendees emphasized the role WTS has played in their career advancement and their own efforts to promote diversity and inclusion in their workplaces. Given the popularity of this event, we hope to host two TED Talks in 2020.



Mid-Career Roundtable / Management Networking Roundtable

The committee hosted two roundtables this year, on June 6 and November 15. The Mid-Career Roundtable is geared toward WTS members with at least 10 years of experience in the transportation industry. Marian Barth of STV, Inc. and Dieckmann Cogill of Jacobs coordinated both events. The roundtable events brought together WTS-Boston members to share their perspectives and experiences through small-group facilitated discussions.

Topics of discussion in 2019 included:

- Assertiveness and the double-bind faced by women in management
- Harnessing your emotional intelligence when leading or using emotional intelligence to drive results
- Pace of work today and in the future
- Remaining relevant professionally

Additionally, in the spring, we modified the name slightly, to Management Networking Roundtable. We have faced some challenges attracting people to this event, which might be due to the timeframe. Two hours at the beginning of a workday might be difficult for many people, so we plan to try out a weeknight event in the spring of 2020.

Emerging Professionals








PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE




On May 9, the committee organized a program on risk

PROGRAMS COMMITTEE

The Programs Committee had a productive and successful year devoted to planning, coordinating, and implementing the Chapter's monthly luncheon programs and the annual summer tour. A summary of our 2019 events and programs is provided below.

February 27, 2019 - Massport Director of Capital Programs and Environmental Affairs Houssam "Sam" Sleiman, P.E., CCM, FCMAA, NAC, Hon. D. Eng.

On February 27, 2019, Massport Director of Capital Programs and Environmental Affairs Houssam "Sam" Sleiman, P.E., CCM, FCMAA, NAC, Hon. D. Eng. provided WTS-Boston luncheon attendees with an overview of the exciting capital programs underway at Massport. Growth in the number of passengers serviced by Logan airport and the number of containers processed at Conley Terminal is driving the



need for improved infrastructure to support the increased volume at these important hubs. To support this demand, Massport's capital program for the next five years is about \$2.6 billion spread over 336 projects. About 31.5% of that program is focused on state of good repair projects to ensure that existing infrastructure is maintained. Massport's capital program is projected to create over 45,700 jobs over the next five years. Sam also described Massport's focus on new technology, efficient delivery, lean and sustainable designs to produce memorable and best-in-class projects.

March 28, 2019 - MassDOT's Registrar of Motor Vehicles, Erin Deveney

On March 28th, 2019, MassDOT's Registrar of Motor Vehicles, Erin Deveney, presented to a captivated audience of WTS-Boston members and guests.

Erin's latest appointment as registrar began with a focus to improve and effectively manage customer service in the overall operation of the Driver Control Unit with an RMV goal to serve 85% of customers in 30 minutes or less. This was accomplished by implementing small changes to streamline the service lines within the RMV. Erin also described the successful replacement of the 33-year old mainframe system for licensing and REAL ID and the



upcoming changes the public should be aware of. After October 1, 2020, you will need a REAL ID or a passport to fly within the United States or enter federal buildings. April 11, 2019 - Governor Baker's Commission on the Future of Transportation Vice Chair Eileen McAnneny and Commission member Carol Lee Rawn.

On Thursday, April 11th, WTS Boston gathered to hear from Governor Baker's Commission on the Future of Transportation Vice Chair Eileen McAnneny and Commission member Carol Lee Rawn.

The Commission, established by Executive Order No. 579 in January 2018, provided recommendations to the Baker-Polito Administration on how to best account for



potential changes in transportation in the future, focusing on transportation needs and challenges facing the Commonwealth between 2020 and 2040. The Commission's 2018 report considers complex factors affecting the future of transportation such as climate change and the intersection of land use, housing and transportation policies. The report relies on scenario planning to help shape plausible future scenarios. The Commission relied on two major trends which will shape people's mobility options and needs and used these two trends to create plausible scenarios: technology adoption and jobs and housing distribution. Eileen and Carol's presentation to WTS focused on the 18 recommendations from Volume 1 of the report.

Thank you to Carol and Eileen for speaking with WTS-Boston! This report will be a vital document to the future of transportation in the Commonwealth.

May 23, 2019 - Representative William Straus - Chair of the Joint Committee on Transportation



On May 23rd, WTS-Boston hosted Representative William Straus, the Chair of the MA Legislature's Joint Committee on Transportation. The Legislature's Joint Committee on Transportation is comprised of -members of the State Senate and the House of Representatives and considers all matters concerning the development, operation, regulation and control air, land, and water transportation.

Representative Straus discussed the overwhelming priority for transportation planning within the State Legislature is to achieve a more realistic understanding of the state-of-repair and fund the necessary transportation expansion projects to maintain economic growth. However, the critical issue is the state's ability to raise funding to achieve that goal.

The quality of the current transportation system, at today's spending level, is unsustainable. The state will require additional transportation spending and funding. Representative Straus discussed the forms in which this increased funding could take; changes to the Transportation Trust Fund, revisions to the gas tax, a vehicle mile traveled tax, or ballot initiatives.

August 15, 2019 - Neponset River Bike Trail with Stella Lansing, DCR, and Michael Trepanier, MassDOT

WTS-Boston members took a Summer Tour of the Neponset River Trail by bike and by foot, with bicycles and helmets provided by BlueBikes.

The tour will begin at Mattapan Station with an introduction and project history from Stella Lansing, with DCR. The tour continued towards Central Avenue, with stops at the Neponset River Bridge and Central Avenue where Michael Trepanier, MassDOT, provided their insight into the MassDOT process and relationship with DCR and the MassDOT trails team.

Cycling participants continued east to Tenean Beach to talk about the upcoming extension before returning to Steel & Rye for delicious food and drink.



September 18, 2019 - Jonathan Gulliver, Massachusetts Department of Transportation's (MassDOT) Highway Administrator

On September 18th, Jonathan Gulliver, Massachusetts Department of Transportation's (MassDOT) Highway Administrator, spoke to WTS-Boston luncheon attendees about the State's current state of congestion and the recently filed Transportation Bond Bill.

Administrator Gulliver opened his remarks with a powerful statistic:



Currently, 81% of the Greater Boston population uses vehicles as their primary mode of

travel, leaving 17% taking public transportation, and only 2% walking/biking. This data point is one of many obtained when MassDOT undertook a comprehensive data-driven analysis of vehicular congestion on major roadways across the state. The congestion study can be found online for further information.

Next, Administrator Gulliver discussed the Baker-Polito five-year Transportation Bond Bill (TBB). Data collected from the Congestion Report was used to build the TBB. The bill aims to authorize and accelerate transportation investment. The \$18 billion TBB will provide capital funding to MassDOT local roads and bridges, regional transit authorities, MBTA capital investments, and municipal partnership programs.

The Congestion Report and the Transportation Bond Bill are both exciting and encouraging for residents throughout the Commonwealth. Thank you to Jonathan Gulliver for joining WTS-Boston and sharing an informative and important presentation!

October 24, 2019 - MBTA's Assistant General Manager for Policy, Laurel Paget-Seekins

On October 24th, 2019, MBTA's Assistant General Manager for Policy, Laurel Paget-Seekins, presented to an audience of WTS-Boston members and guests on how the MBTA is combining data and public involvement into policy decision-making.

Laurel opened her presentation highlighting the difficulty of combining data analytics and public input. While data analysis and public input are different decision-making aids, they both rely on a similar outcome: to discover new ideas, issues, and details. Both factfinding missions require asking the right questions, keeping an open mind, recognizing when the results don't align with a hypothesis, and iteratively assessing the data points for the best possible outcome. Combining data analysis and public input can complement one another to fill in critical gaps to create a more complete picture and better overall understanding.

Some challenges Laurel highlighted include turning raw data into something understandable that the public can react to; implementing the gathered knowledge in a timely manner and balancing the combination of data and the public input to be able to recognize when data aren't telling the whole story. The MBTA is in process of working through these challenges and learning from their experiences to create a better process moving forward.

Laurel finished by asking the audience what the MBTA and MassDOT need to change for the concepts presented to be incorporated into standard practice. Several audience members noted the process described can be expensive and lengthy, but wholly worthwhile.

November 21, 2019 - Karilyn Crockett, Lecturer in Public Policy & Urban Planning in MIT's Department of Urban Studies & Planning, and guest Ann Hershfang, President of America Walks and WalkBoston

On November 21st Karilyn Crockett, Lecturer in Public Policy & Urban Planning in MIT's Department of Urban Studies & Planning, and guest Ann Hershfang, President of America Walks and WalkBoston, presented at the November luncheon seminar and shared how activists came together to stop a highway from being built through the heart of Boston and published in Crockett's 2018



book titled, "People Before Highways: Boston Activists, Urban Planners, and a New Movement for City Making."

The movement mobilized from the neighborhood level to the Massachusetts State House. On January 25, 1969, Ms. Hershfang, along with 2,000 others, confronted the new governor, Francis Sergeant, determined to change his mind about the highway. Sergeant had been the Head of the Department of Public Works and had a pro-highway stance. Their pleas worked, and in 1972 Governor Sergeant put a stop to the expansion and instead introduced an alternative transportation plan that included community parks, gardens, and basketball courts. None of this would have been possible without the persistence of the activists.

On January 25, 2019, a reenactment was held at the State House to celebrate the anniversary of the People Before Highways protest. The same activists from 50 years earlier, were united again to celebrate their victory. Many of these activists went on to be public servants who made positive changes in the city they loved so much. Ms. Hershfang reminds us that when you truly care about something, to work for it. Anything is possible even with the odds stacked against you.

December 19, 2019 Astrid Glynn, MassDOT Rail and Transit Adminstrator

On December 19th, 2018, MassDOT's Rail and Transit Administrator, Astrid Glynn, spoke to WTS-Boston members and guests at the annual meeting. Astrid gave a riveting presentation about the changing landscape of regional transit in Massachusetts. She first discussed the 2018 Commission on the Future of Transportation report which provided



several recommendations for the Commonwealth's transportation future including providing robust, reliable, clean and efficient public transportation is a foundational element of our transportation system in Massachusetts which, in many communities, will rely on the Regional Transit Authorities (RTAs). After discussing the challenges the Commission's report identified, Astrid highlighted several key milestones since its publication: First, the appointment of a diverse taskforce to examine how RTAs could improve and, second, the FY20 state budget which increased contract assistance for RTAs. The legislature also directed MassDOT and each RTA to establish Memorandums of Understanding (MOU) with baseline and targets in the four key performance areas. Lastly, it provided a second year of discretionary grants to encourage innovation and support pilots. Astrid described two exciting projects piloted by the Brockton Area Transit and Franklin County Transit Authority which highlight the RTA's willingness to try something new and measure the results of that innovation. The RTAs are committing themselves to experiments that might succeed and might fail but will be evaluated based on data. Last, Astrid discussed the important next step for all RTAs which will be preparing their updated Comprehensive Transit Plans. These plans will capture and analyze data for route planning and establish new equitable fare policies with a focus on gateway cities and rural transportation, as highlighted in the Commission report. Each RTA's plan will be unique and tailored to the challenges of their region to aid in improving performance.

Prior to Astrid's presentation address, WTS-Boston Chapter President, Sarah Dennechuk recognized all Past Presidents of WTS-Boston. These pioneering women have contributed to the success of WTS-Boston and WTS International for decades. Sarah also thanked the 2019 sponsors as vital to the organizations mission and announced WTS-Boston will be celebrating its 40th Anniversary in 2020! She also recongonized our 2020 Emerging Professionals: Katie Kalugin, MBTA and Ambar Johnson, Livable Streets and highlighted the unveiling of WTS's Public Art at South station! Sarah closed the Annual Meeting

recongnizing the outgoing 2019 chapter leadership and welcoming the incoming Chapter leadership.



PUBLIC ART COMMITTEE

WTS-Boston commissioned a new public art installation to celebrate the contributions, diversity and creativity that women bring to the transportation industry. Working with MassDOT and the MBTA, the piece was installed in Red Line Concourse at South Station. The art is a permanent piece commemorating women's contributions to transportation in the Greater Boston area. The art enhances this main transit hub and continues the proud tradition of public art already adorning the MBTA system.

WTS-Boston Public Art Piece is now complete!

After 12 years of hard work by WTS-Boston and our Public Art Committee, a new piece of art has been created to help raise awareness of women's contributions to the transportation industry. The piece, titled "NETWORK" and designed by artist Ellen Harvey, is a 650-SF, hand-made in Italy, glass mosaic. The mosaic fabrication was completed by Miotto Mosaic Art Studios, Inc., and Travisanutto Giovanni SRL. The beautiful piece wraps the interior of the headhouse entrance to Boston's South Station at the northeast corner of Summer Street and Atlantic Avenue.



Today Boston's South Station is the hub for a vast transportation network, encompassing not only the railways and subways but also the roads that link it to the rest of the country. The location of South Station however, reveals a not-so distant past where Boston Harbor and its rivers were the primary means of transportation. We take this transformation from natural to artificial networks for granted but it is the result of human action and human decision-making. We all travel within a hidden history of engineers, architects, surveyors, builders and politicians - many of who were women, as WTS-Boston reminds us and as we too often forget.

The co-chairs for the 2019 Outreach committee were Heather Moulton, STV Incorporated, and Stefanie Beaver, VHB. Selma Mandzo, VHB, acted as Board Liaison to the committee. For the beginning of 2019, the Outreach committee was busy attending local STEM expo events to showcase our program and engage students with a hands-on activity. For all of these events, the activity was Straw Bridges which was a continuation from Fall 2018. Attendees were given straws, tape, and a wooden platform and were tasked with seeing how much weight their bridge could hold.

New Year Reception

On January 29th, WTS-Boston members and sponsors gathered for an evening of networking at the UMass Club in Boston. The UMass Club provided a beautiful setting for the Chapter's annual New Year Reception which offers a time for friends and colleagues to reconnect after the holidays and discuss professional goals for the new year.

The evening opened with welcoming remarks from the Chapter's new President, Sarah Dennechuk, Senior Project Manager at Massport. Sarah discussed the continued importance of an organization like WTS-Boston in supporting the advancement of women in transportation. She recognized the key role that members, chapter leadership, and sponsors play in maintaining and fostering the WTS-Boston network and the immense value this has on members' professional and personal growth.

This year, the keynote speaker was the new General Manager of the MBTA, Steve Poftak. On January 1, 2019, Steve Poftak joined the MBTA as General Manager. General Manager Poftak, who previously served as the Vice Chair of the Fiscal and Management Control Board and as a Director of the MassDOT Board since 2015, came to the MBTA from the Harvard Kennedy School, where he was Executive Director of the Rappaport Institute for Greater Boston. General Manager Poftak expressed that it is a privilege for him to serve the MBTA and the people of the Boston Region in his new position. The General Manager outlined his five priorities for the T:

- Safety of vital importance and encompasses the safety of customers and employees.
- Human capital value of hard work and the importance of supporting employees in doing their best work. He also stressed his desire to build diversity within the T.
- Implementation of the capital plan the goal of the T is to invest \$8 billion over the next five years. This is a dramatic increase in capital spending over previous years' goals and

successful implementation of capital projects will need to be supported by an organization that can deliver on the scale and complexity inherent in this level of investment.

- Customer experience much of the focus of planned investments will be on improvements that customers can feel and feel soon.
- Fiscal discipline two main approaches to keep the T on track towards fiscal discipline: strategic hires and strategic investments.

In addition to these main areas of focus, Poftak touched on some of the specific initiatives and projects planned, including the acquisition of new cars on the red, orange, and green lines as well as the development and roll-out of the Automated Fare Collection 2.0 system.

On April 23rd, WTS-Boston's 23rd Annual Leadership Forum honored Judith Nitsch, PE, LEED AP BD+C, over breakfast at the Courtyard Boston Downtown. Over 100 WTS-Boston members, sponsors, and invited guests gathered for this annual event that honors an exceptional female in the field. Ms. Nitsch was selected for this award



due to her 40+ year commitment to building better communities and her visionary leadership.

Ms. Nitsch is the Founding Principle of Nitsch Engineering, Inc., a 100+ person firm headquartered in Boston, and with offices in Washington DC, Worcester, MA, and Lawrence, MA. Established in 1989, the firm has provided civil, structural, and transportation engineering; land surveying; planning; green infrastructure consulting; and GIS services on projects in 20 states and 5 countries. Judy is a graduate of Worcester Polytechnic Institute (WPI) with a B.S. in Civil Engineering. She is a registered professional engineer in 27 states, and is a LEED Accredited Professional BD+C. She received an honorary Doctor of Science degree from the Massachusetts Maritime Academy in 2010 and an honorary Doctor of Engineering from WPI in 2015. Her work as a civil engineer has focused on the design, permitting, and management of site development and infrastructure-related projects. Much of

her firm's civil engineering work includes consulting for and designing the sustainable sites aspects of green building and green infrastructure projects.

Annual Scholarships and Awards Dinner



Award Recipients

The Annual Chapter Awards recognize individuals and companies/agencies for the positive impact they have made to our industry and in our communities. This year's award winners included:

Rosa Parks Diversity Leadership Award was presented to Laura Brelsford. Laura Brelsford is
the Assistant General Manager for System-Wide Accessibility (SWA) at the MBTA. Since
joining the T in 2007, Laura has been at the forefront of the T's mission to become the
nationwide model of an accessible public transportation system. This has included developing









key programs aimed at driving and sustaining long-term change such as the agency's internal access monitoring program, new trainings for both employees and customers, and system-wide barrier removal program termed the Plan for Accessible Transportation Infrastructure (PATI). A graduate of Mount Holyoke College and former investigator with the Massachusetts Commission Against Discrimination (MCAD), Laura served as past chair of the Cambridge Commission for Persons with Disabilities and is currently on the board of the Boston Area Rape Crisis Center (BARCC). She is the recipient of the Marie Feltin Award for outstanding advocacy and WalkBoston's Golden Shoe for improving access to bus stops. However, she is most proud of her role in helping

ensure people with disabilities have a seat at the decision-making table—a change that continues to improve services for all.

WTS-Boston Member of the Year Award was presented to Lori Chicoyne. Lori Chicoyne serves as Director of Client Development for BSC Group, Inc., a collaborative practice of planners, engineers, and scientists, as well as Geonetics, Inc., a boutique group of software developers. She focuses on expansion goals and visibility for the firm, increasing overall awareness of the BSC name, brand, and services to help drive growth. Lori has more than 25 years of leadership experience in professional services marketing overseeing business development, marketing planning, and marketing communications efforts. Lori is a leader in industry organizations and served as the National Conference Co-Chair for the WTS Annual Conference held in Boston in May 2019.



Previously, Lori served in several leadership roles for WTS-Boston, including Director-at-Large and Co-Chair of various committees. In 2017, she was instrumental in securing a prime spot on Chronical, an award-winning New England television program, featuring WTS and local leading women in transportation. Lori is a Past President of the Society for Marketing Professional Services (SMPS) Boston Chapter. She earned her BS in business administration, with a major in marketing, from Bryant University.

Innovative Transportation Solutions Award was presented to Boston BRT. The Barr Foundation's BostonBRT initiative was convened in 2013 as part of Barr's climate program, acknowledging that any serious efforts to address climate change must advance solutions for mobility. This initiative raised awareness and generated support for Gold Standard BRT



throughout Greater Boston. The work started with an analysis to determine if and where Gold Standard BRT might be technically feasible in Greater Boston, which resulted in a June 2015 report that identified five priority corridors. The BostonBRT team organized learning trips to Mexico City so that political, nonprofit, and business leaders could experience BRT firsthand, speak to its benefits, and champion its adoption in Greater Boston. The team also engaged bus commuters and the design community to

visualize the potential of a better bus experience, through a <u>photography challenge</u> to find beauty in the everyday bus commute, a <u>station design competition</u> to visualize the potential of bus stops, and more. In 2017 and 2018, the initiative supported <u>four pilots</u> that demonstrated the benefits of BRT elements and fostered municipal and MBTA partnerships. Three of the pilots have since become permanent. The combination of these activities over the last six years has shifted the conversation in Greater Boston to include bus rapid transit as a viable transportation solution in Massachusetts. • Honorable Ray LaHood Award was presented to Bill Rizzo. Bill is an Advisor and Board Member to transportation-related consulting companies, including HMMH, a WBE/DBE. Previously he served as Assistant secretary of Transportation for the Commonwealth, COO of Geocomp Corporation and Co-Founder and President of Rizzo Associates (now Tetra Tech). He is a National Fellow of the American Council of Engineering Companies and served as Chairman of the Engineering Center Education Trust in Boston. Bill holds a BS and MS in Civil Engineering from Lehigh University and Georgia Tech, respectively.



- WTS-Boston's 2019 Employer of the Year Award was presented to Jacobs. Jacobs is a strong supporter of WTS, locally (Boston), nationally, and internationally. Strategic Boston office hires were and will continue to be recruited because of their active WTS-Boston leadership roles. The firm is committed to the advancement of women, best exhibited by the percentage of female employees in leadership positions. In fact, Jacobs' Boston office has significant numbers of women in every leadership category, atypical in our industry. Jacobs participation in Catalyst CEO Champions for Change, underscores commitment, starting from the top to improve Jacobs' record of advancing females up the ranks. The firm developed a formal Women's Network to promote an inclusive culture, where women and men can thrive and feel valued. Its mission is to accelerate a cultural shift by empowering women and promoting gender equality, aiming to balance representation, influence recruitment, development, retention and promotion of qualified women, and to champion women leaders. Jacobs also supports female employees by encouraging active participation **JACOBS** in external professional organizations focusing on career advancement, structured around inclusion, diversity, and conscious inclusion programs.
- WTS-Boston's 2019 Woman of the Year Award was presented to Patricia Leavenworth, P.E. Patty has worked at MassDOT for 32 years and became MassDOT's Chief Engineer P.E., (Highway Division) in June 2013. She and her teams work to deliver a \$1 Billion Construction



program annually on hundreds of projects in 351 towns and cities across Massachusetts. Graduating from Norwich University, '87 B.S. Civil Engineer and M.S. Civil Engineering '99 at Worcester Polytechnic Institute; Patty started her career in Worcester, MA in 1987 and has worked in various positions including Design Engineer, District Environmental Engineer, and District Highway Director. Some of her major accomplishments include development of a District Construction Database, overseeing a \$16 million cable-stayed bridge in Fitchburg, and managed the award-winning Fast 14 project that replaced 14 bridges in 10 weekends on I-93 in Medford, MA. Most recently she is engaged in improving project delivery, building a fully integrated

asset management system for the Highway Division, as well as serving as chair to the Asset Management Council for the agency. Patty's passion for engineering has steered her career and helped promote engineering within the Commonwealth by hosting an annual Innovation Conference and founded the READi Committee for new innovations and pilot programs for MassDOT Highway Division.

Special Projects and Young Professionals in Transportation (YPT)-Boston Joint Event

The WTS-Boston Special Projects Committees collaborated with YPT-Boston to plan a tour, presentation, and networking hour at the Encore Casino in Everett. The event was held on October 10 and drew 50 professionals between WTS and YPT.

Jay Monty, Transportation Planner at the City of Everett, led a walking tour of the casino campus highlighting the infrastructure improvements both on- and off-site that have been constructed as part of the casino's development. These include better sidewalks, buffered bicycle lanes, and safer crosswalks in the vicinity surrounding the casino on Broadway. On the casino property, improvements include a restored waterfront, dock area for water taxi transportation, and the future completion of the Northern Strand Community Trail.



After the outdoor tour, James Folk, Executive Director of Transportation for Encore Boston Harbor, gave a detailed technical presentation about the transportation analysis, planning, design, and engineering work that was undertaken by the Wynn development team and the City in order to prepare for the construction and operations of the casino.


