Brandye Hendrickson - Deputy Executive Director of TxDOT

As Deputy Executive Director of TxDOT, Brandye Hendrickson is responsible for directing the planning and administration functions of the agency, in addition to government affairs, communications, strategy and innovation, and modal programs. She began her career with the Indiana DOT as the Deputy Commissioner of Human Resources. Brandye was recruited as the first District Commissioner in Indiana. She spent seven years in that position, and it was her favorite job. It eventually led to her becoming the Commissioner of the DOT.

As the Commissioner of the DOT, Brandye was a direct report to the governor. When Governor Mike Pence decided to run for Vice President, she was appointed to serve at the FHWA. Brandye said during her time at the FHWA she was able to work on many exciting things and saw things from a national perspective.

Following her stint at FHWA Brandye went to work at AASHTO. She worked on both funding and improving diversity at the national level. While she was there, she met and began to work with previous TxDOT Executive Director James Bass.

In 2021 Brandye was given the opportunity to come to Texas and work for TxDOT and she jumped at the chance. In July of 2021 Brandye was appointed as Deputy Executive Director of TxDOT.

For Brandye, she feels like this is an amazing time in transportation, but it is also a challenging time. When she joined TxDOT they reorganized the department. They divided the organization into two functional areas. One functional area is focused on project delivery, and the other functional area,, Brandye's side, is strategy and innovation, government affairs, communications, and administration. There is also a Planning and Mobil Program Division.

Brandye talked about wrapping the last fiscal year with a \$10 billion program. She mentioned how people in the room at the luncheon helped with that program. She also said they are anticipating an \$11 billion program in 2023.

In August TxDOT updated their Unified Transportation Program to a 10-year, \$85 billion program. They are investing \$14 billion in rural areas, which is up from \$2 billion. Part of the new infrastructure bill has given TxDOT \$25 billion over the next five years, which is up about \$1 billion.

Brandye feels that Texas is fortunate to have a well-funded state program and federal money is icing on the cake. TxDOT is anticipating an increase in the transportation alternatives program and a chance to create a large projects program for communities across the state. Brandye expressed how TxDOT will need help with connecting with local communities throughout the state.

With the approval of the national electric vehicle infrastructure plan, TxDOT is going to be installing charging stations along the interstate – EV chargers. They have allocated \$408 million to partner with the private sector to build and maintain the infrastructure. She said they also want to make sure rural parts of the state aren't left out.

Brandye expressed how the IIJA is providing significantly more funding for new grant programs. They are trying to make sure all great considerations are pushed through the program. TxDOT is also trying to figure out programs and projects to partner with local communities and what makes the most sense for everyone. Brandye feels that it is a blessing and a challenge. Some of the new programs will need time to understand. TxDOT will be working closely with the FHWA to deliver on





these projects. Internally TxDOT is working hard to get projects ready.

Brandye said there is a universe of people at TxDOT making sure they can meet the \$11 billion target for 2023. Because of the need to get projects ready, TxDOT is increasing the consultant budget to \$1.35 billion to make sure they have the resources to get projects done.

The WTS HOT Chapter thanks Brandye for speaking at our luncheon.

NOVEMBER LUNCHEON



Christiana Astarita, PE Project Manager, TxDOT

Christiana Astarita provided the WTS HOT Chapter with an update on the Oak Hill Parkway project at our November luncheon meeting. She is the TxDOT Austin District Project Manager for the Oak Hill Parkway Design-Build Project. This project consists of the design and construction of approximately 6 miles of improvements along US 290 from Circle Drive to Loop 1 (MoPac) and approximately 1 mile of improvements along SH 71 West from US 290 to Silvermine Drive, including the full reconstruction of the US 290/SH 71 interchange. Christiana

has 20 years of progressive engineering design, construction, and project management experience in the major metropolitan areas of Austin, Honolulu, and Las Vegas. Her experience focuses on project transportation mobility solutions.

Past roles included serving as the project manager for the SH 71 Express (also SH 71 Toll Lanes) Design-Build Project, as well as managing the Central Texas Regional Mobility Authority (CTRMA) Local Government Oversight Program for projects in construction. Christiana received her Bachelor of Science in Civil Engineering from the University of Nevada, Las Vegas.

ADELIZA RAMIREZ, SECRETARY 2023

Where did you grow up?

I grew up in South Texas in the small town of Hebbronville. And that's South Texas y'all, not the valley. It's totally different!!

How long have you been in Austin, and how did you end

up here? I've been in Austin for 20 years when I made the decision to come to UT to study Civil Engineering. I'm the youngest of three girls and both my sisters already lived in Austin so it made the decision easy. Plus, UT has the most amazing engineering program and UT football is the best!

How long have you been a member of WTS? What prompted you to join and what has been your best experience so far?



I attended my first WTS event in 2015 with my supervisor at the time; I am a late bloomer! I've been an official member since 2017. I joined because the lunch topics are different than other organizations and the camaraderie. I was also impressed with the scholarship and awards that were awarded at the gala. It was amazing to see great people in the industry get recognized for their hard work. WTS truly does an amazing job at scholarship fundraising!

Tell us about your job...

I was recently promoted to Office Manager for the Volkert South Austin Office. I've been in this position for only a few months so I'm still settling into the job. As a former TxDOT employee, I'm a technical resource to navigating the TxDOT process, identifying key TxDOT personnel to aid in plan review for troubleshooting. I serve as QA/QC manager for various projects, most recently for CapEx North. I also lead the local municipal and developer driven projects for roadway widenings, turn lanes, and various roadway improvements.

What has been your favorite project thus far?

Favorite project so far must be CapEx North, which just let a few months ago. This was my first big project at Volkert, oh wait it's also the biggest design-bid-build ever let in the state of Texas. It was amazing to see this big project come together during a pandemic when so many of the decision makers were working from home. This project had so many moving parts and some aspects of the project changed as the project progressed and it was also amazing to see how Volkert did this project. Not only did so many of the employees in Texas touch this project but employees from several states as well. It will be awesome to see how this project looks when it is completed.

What has been your favorite moment in your career?

My favorite moment has been seeing large overhead and ground mounted signs that I designed out

in the world! Back when I worked in TxDOT I did a stint in the traffic ops section, and I was tasked with designing the first signs in the Austin District that were for the superstreet and CFIs. These were the first innovative intersections in the district so I needed to do some research on what would be best suited for the driver. Although the superstreet at SH 71 has been replaced you can still see the CFI signs in Oak Hill, at least for a little bit longer! I also designed the 6th street exit sign on NB IH 35.

What's the best career advice you've been offered?

Ask questions, don't be afraid to get dirty, and don't forget your voice.

What time did you wake up this morning? Do you have a morning ritual?

I wake up every morning usually up by 6 am, sometimes earlier. My morning ritual consists of watching/ listening to KVUE Daybreak — I love the banter between the broadcasters.
