Though she initially worked in materials testing, she soon discovered her true passion for roadway design, leading to a career spanning over 25 years. Today, she plays a key role in advancing Georgia's infrastructure, having contributed to major projects like the Transform 285/400 initiative and the I-285/I-20 West Interchange.

Beth Ann Schwartz is an active leader within WTS Atlanta, serving as a Director at Large on the Chapter Board. She is deeply committed to the organization, contributing to its growth through planning, promotion, and engagement. Her longstanding dedication is evident in her leadership roles, including Scholarship Luncheon Committee Chair, Silent Auction Chair, and multiple board positions such as WTS Secretary and Vice-President of Membership. As a graduate and current mentor in the WTS Mentor-Protégé Program, she continues to support the development of future leaders. Tonia Brown: From Structural Foundations to Roadway Innovations Path to Transportation

While studying at Georgia Tech, Tonia Brown gained early exposure to transportation by interning at GDOT. After graduation, she started her career at a DBE firm, spending a few years refining her skills before pivoting to structural engineering—working in oil and gas on steel platforms/ designing offshore platforms. This experience proved invaluable, opening doors for her as firms recognized her ability to tackle complex engineering challenges. She then joined JJG, where she continued to expand her expertise, and soon after, she transitioned to Jacobs. Now, after 20 years at Jacobs and 23 years in the transportation industry, she has built an extraordinary career, making a lasting impact on roadway design and infrastructure development. Her journey is a testament to the power of adaptability and engineering excellence in shaping a successful professional path.

Current Role in WTS Atlanta

Tonia Brown has been an active member of WTS since 2019, dedicating her time and leadership to advancing women in transportation. She currently serves on the 2025-2026 Atlanta Chapter Board as a Director-at-Large and has been deeply involved in mentorship and outreach initiatives within the organization. Since 2020, she has participated in the Mentor-Protégé Program as a Mentor, later serving as Co-Chair in 2022 and Chair in 2024. Her commitment was further demonstrated when she successfully led the Tours and Transportation Subcommittee for the 2023 WTS Annual Conference in Atlanta, showcasing innovative and impactful projects shaping Georgia's transportation landscape. As a Board member, she continues to contribute as a committee member and Board liaison for WTS Atlanta's Student Engagement, Community Outreach, and Transportation You programs, reinforcing her dedication to fostering future transportation leaders and strengthening the community.

A Moment that Reinforced Her Passion

One of the most defining moments in Tonia Brown's career—when she truly felt her passion for transportation engineering—was seeing one of her first projects go from design to reality. The project, Lithonia Industrial Boulevard Phase 2 in DeKalb County, was particularly meaningful because it was built in her own backyard, near Stone Mountain. She recalls the moment she was finally able to drive on the roadway she designed, knowing every drainage structure, curb, sidewalk, and even the bridge had her mark on it. The project had a little bit of everything—railroad crossings, signalization, walls, and complex staging with detours—making it a true test of her engineering expertise. To this day, she finds herself pointing it out to her daughter, a reminder of the tangible impact of her work. That moment reinforced her love for what she does, proving that the projects she designs don't just exist on paper—they become essential parts of the communities she serves.

A Moment She Felt on the Right Track

Tonia feels unstoppable in this moment—not because of a title, but because of the impact she can make. She's in a position where she can pay it forward, encouraging, empowering, and protecting others. She mentioned that it's not just younger engineers—it's also senior-level professionals who may not realize they need someone to speak up for them. Whether they're working hard behind the scenes or unaware of opportunities that could benefit their careers and livelihoods, Tonia ensures their voices are heard. She's using her experience and influence to advocate for those who aren't at the table, creating meaningful change in the industry.

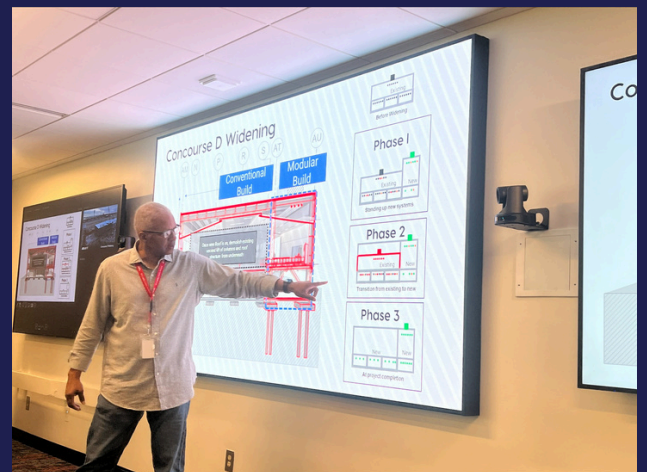

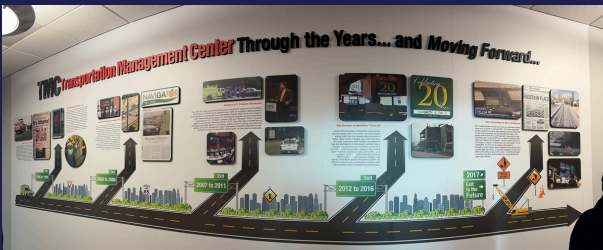

We conducted a mock interview exercise to target building confidence and prepare the students for job interviews and applications in February. Our March meeting included a technical tour of the GDOT TMC Operations Facility. On this tour GDOT TMC highlighted overseeing traffic and accidents, winter preparations, showcasing the operations floor with the CCTV video streams, and the technology utilized to make travel safer in the state of Georgia. For April and May, our program hosted two WTS young professionals and Karri Thomas, P.E. (Jacobs) presented a recent project about Construction Engineering Inspections with the SR400 - 285 interchange redesign. GDOT's Transportation Management Center (TMC) is ground zero for mobility in the state and the nerve center for our world-class intelligent transportation system (ITS). Operating 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, the TMC is committed to enhancing travel safety and transportation efficiency by managing incidents,

controlling traffic, and providing accurate information to the traveling public. WTS Transportation You committee members accompanied South Atlanta High School students on a tour of the operations facility including a video presentation, speaking directly with the women in leadership, and getting a firsthand look at Ops Floor. A big thanks to Anslee Schroeder, Ariana Ward, Kim Williams, and our friends at GDOT TMC for making this educational tour possible.

The committee had great discussions about the public modes of transportation, and all the different coordination and firms involved to make this project truly safe and successful. Additionally, the TYOU group discussed how to advocate for yourself



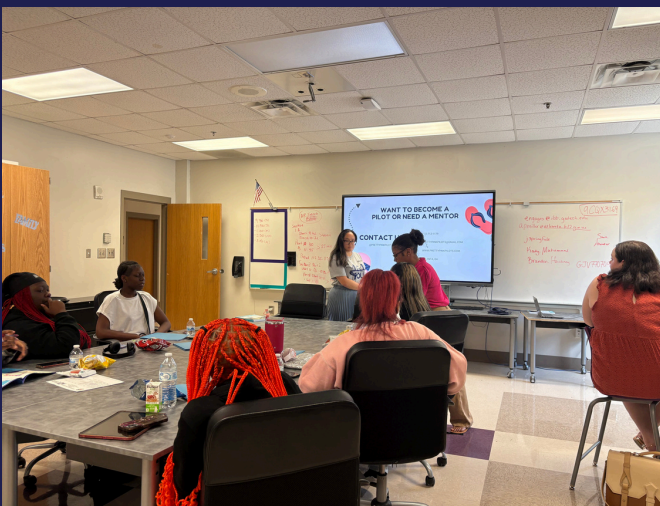
