- We closed the year with our holiday event celebrating with our member and friends, and as a bonus, hosted a joint event with GAITE.

Meet the Board & Committee Chairs Series

Krystal Dixon : Keeping Projects on Track: A Career Built on Strategy & Service

Path to Transportation

Krystal began her career far from transportation, earning a bachelor's degree in Ceramic Engineering from Georgia Tech and spending 14 years at Corning Glass in engineering and quality roles. There, she discovered a passion for project management and became a certified project manager.

She returned to Atlanta, where a Georgia Tech career fair led her to GDOT, which was building its first project management office. Joining in 2009 as one of the agency's first external project managers, she advanced quickly despite having no prior transportation experience. She ultimately served as District Program Manager for Districts 3 and 4 and later as Assistant Office Head, overseeing a \$2.5 billion portfolio spanning Georgia's northern districts and managing roughly 250 projects and 25 project managers.

After 13 years with GDOT, she founded Paradigm Project Leadership Group, a consulting firm helping local governments navigate federally funded transportation projects. Although impactful, the niche nature of the work made scaling difficult.

She later returned to the corporate sector as a Senior Project Manager at Arcadis, where she enjoys applying her leadership experience while focusing deeply on project delivery as an individual contributor.

A Moment that Reinforced Her Passion

Krystal recalls discovering her passion for project management early in her career at Corning. After gaining experience in project engineering, new product development, and quality assurance, she was given the opportunity to manage her first project. Bringing together complex moving parts developing a plan, managing a budget, and coordinating schedules allowed all of her strengths to align. The experience highlighted her communication, organizational, and problem solving skills and confirmed that project management was where she truly thrived. "That was the moment I realized this is my thing," she reflects.

A Moment She Felt on the Right Track

Krystal points to her time as Assistant Office Head in GDOT's Office of Program Delivery as a defining moment when everything aligned. Responsible for overseeing nearly 250 projects and leading 25 project managers, she faced a major challenge when GDOT set an ambitious goal of letting \$100 million in projects each month. Knowing how complex and demanding the plan development process could be, Krystal drew on a guiding principle from The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People: "Begin with the end in mind."

By shifting the team's focus to delivering high quality project concepts on time, she helped establish a strong foundation for success in later phases. The results were transformative on time concept submissions increased from roughly 20-25% to nearly 90%. The success not only kept projects on schedule but also earned recognition from GDOT leadership, reinforcing that her strategic approach and leadership were making a meaningful, lasting impact.

Current Role in WTS Atlanta

Krystal Dixon served as Co-Chair of the WTS Atlanta D&I Committee, where she helped lead learning and networking initiatives centered on diversity, inclusion, and support for DBEs and small businesses in the transportation sector. As industry needs evolved, she guided the committee in shifting its focus toward small business support, helping firms understand how to work with GDOT as primes or subconsultants and ensuring they had access to the resources needed to compete effectively. Her leadership strengthened connections, expanded awareness, and advanced more equitable opportunities across the transportation industry.

Melanie Robinson: From Healthcare to Highways: A Journey into Transportation

Path to Transportation

Melanie's journey into transportation was a nontraditional one. She earned her master's degree in Exercise Physiology from Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Virginia, and began her career in healthcare, while also gaining experience in higher education, leadership development, and project management. During a period of transition, Melanie leaned into her transferable skills and reached out to a former classmate, which ultimately led her to an opportunity at Gresham Smith.

Since joining the transportation industry in 2023, Melanie has been fascinated by the process behind how projects come together from preconstruction and public involvement to the many technical and political factors that shape infrastructure decisions. Transportation has provided her with the flexibility, growth, and opportunity to stretch professionally while contributing to work that impacts communities in meaningful ways.

A Moment that Reinforced Her Passion

Melanie shares that she hasn't experienced one singular "aha" moment just yet but instead, a growing realization. Through her work at Gresham Smith, she's discovered that healthcare was not the right long-term fit, and that transportation has given her the space to stretch, grow, and refine her skills in meaningful ways. Rather than simply relying on what she already knew, Melanie has been encouraged to develop new strengths and challenge herself professionally.

Her involvement with WTS has further reinforced that feeling, allowing her to stay connected to what has always mattered most to her supporting students, creating access, and opening doors to new opportunities. Together, these experiences have confirmed that she's on the right path and doing work that truly aligns with her passions.

Current Role in WTS Atlanta

Melanie currently serves as the Co-Chair of the Scholarship Luncheon Committee for WTS Atlanta. With a strong background in planning and logistics, Melanie plays a key role in coordinating the Scholarship Luncheon and helping bring its many moving pieces together. A Moment She Felt on the Right Track



Melanie recalls feeling on the right track as she began to see transportation from a new perspective. What once looked like routine construction became a complex puzzle involving planning, coordination, funding, and public input. As she learned how these elements come together during the preconstruction phase, she found herself more engaged and curious about the work. Gaining that behind-the-scenes understanding helped her realize that transportation was a field where she could continue learning and growing.

Leadership in Motion: Bianca George Bridges Transportation and Communication

Path to Transportation

Bianca's path into transportation was unplanned but transformative. With a formal education in architecture, she began her career focused on design and technical execution, never anticipating a future in transportation infrastructure. After earning her Bachelor of Architecture from Hampton University, Bianca worked at several architectural firms before joining Corporate Environmental Risk Management (CERM) in Atlanta in 2016. It was there, through her work on the Renew Atlanta infrastructure program, that she was introduced to project management and the broader world of transportation an opportunity that ultimately reshaped her career trajectory.

What began as a chance opportunity quickly became a defining shift. Transitioning from architectural design to project management allowed Bianca to engage directly with stakeholders and better understand how infrastructure decisions affect daily operations and long-term community needs. That hands on experience solidified her role in transportation and affirmed her strengths in coordination, leadership, and delivering projects that support public systems and services.

A Moment that Reinforced Her Passion

Bianca's passion for transportation has been reinforced not by a single project, but by the rhythm and responsibility of project management itself. As she began leading projects, she recognized how much she valued being accountable for outcomes, coordinating teams, managing scope, and ensuring details aligned with client and stakeholder expectations. The ability to guide projects from planning through execution confirmed that this role was where her strengths were best utilized.

Bianca finds fulfillment in mentoring others and paying forward the guidance she received early in her career. She serves in an advisory role on DeKalb PAL and CERM Legacy Foundation Secretary and participates in job shadowing events. At WTS, she provides opportunities for others on the committee to learn, grow, and take initiative. These experiences reinforce her passion daily, combining her love of leadership, collaboration, and meaningful impact in the industry.

A Moment She Felt on the Right Track

Bianca feels most on track when she is fully immersed in her projects, coordinating teams, reviewing work, giving guidance from start to finish, and maintaining clarity across moving parts. "I find a way to get locked in on every project," she said. "I give feedback, assign tasks, and make sure everything aligns with the client's scope. That's where I feel my strengths of balancing the details with the bigger picture truly shine." For Bianca, these moments of focus and control are when she knows she is operating at her best, fully in her element. That consistent engagement, paired with the opportunity to contribute to infrastructure that supports daily operations and public services, has continued to reaffirm her commitment to the transportation field and to the leadership role she plays within it.

PORT OF SAVANNAH TOUR

O

n October 8, 2025, the WTS Atlanta Chapter joined the WTS Savannah Chapter for an exclusive, behind-the-scenes collaborative learning experience tour of the Georgia Ports Authority (GPA) in Savannah, Georgia also known as the Garden City Terminal. The chapters had the opportunity to see firsthand how one of the nation's most dynamic port systems operates. The visit offered a fascinating look at the Garden City Terminal, one of the busiest container terminals in North America.



Each year, Georgia's Ports handle more than 5.6 million containers, supported by some of the most advanced logistics and technology in the industry. Nearly all cranes and yard equipment are now electrically powered, reducing emissions while improving operational efficiency. Looking ahead, the Garden City Terminal is planning a 50% expansion by 2030 to accommodate increasing global commerce.

One of the most impressive milestones is the construction of a direct roadway connection to the interstate, allowing truck drivers to retrieve containers and head north without encountering a single traffic signal until reaching major destinations like Atlanta.
